Course Description

This is a survey course in Anglican theology that will involve extensive reading and regular analysis and writing. Using the lens of the *Book of Common Prayer* (BCP) as a way of approaching the general trajectory of Anglican theological thinking, this course will survey some of the developmental sweep of Anglican (mostly English) theological reflection based on the BCP, and, more importantly, will focus in on particular parts of the BCP itself for theological analysis. Beginning with Wycliffe and Tyndale, the course will move through a number of writers into the early 21st century.

Policy on Assignment and Course Extensions

Late work: Basic Degree students are expected to hand in assignments by the date given in the course outline. Under exceptional circumstances a student may request a short extension to be negotiated with the instructor. Instructors are not obliged to accept assignments that are late. If the instructor chooses to accept an assignment, where an extension has not been requested and approved before the due date, then **one percentage point per day will be deducted.** The absolute deadline for the submission of assignments is the examination day scheduled for the course or the last day of exam week for the semester in which the course is taught, whichever is sooner.

Students with documented medical or compassionate difficulties or exceptional reasons (e.g., a death in the family or a serious illness) who are unable to submit their work by the end of the term are requested to consult with their instructor and request an SDF. The absolute deadline for obtaining an SDF for the course is the examination day scheduled for the course or the last day of examination week, whichever is sooner. An SDF must be requested from the registrar's office no later than the last day of exam week in which the course is taken. The SDF, when approved, will have a mutually agreed upon deadline that does not extend beyond one year. If a student has not completed work but has not been granted an SDF, a final mark will be submitted calculating a zero for work not submitted.

Generative writing tools like Chat GPT, Google Translate, Grammarly, and QuillBot are not permitted in this course unless they have been explicitly approved in writing by the course instructor. Any assignment (quiz, essay, exam, etc.) that is found to have used AI tools when they were not explicitly permitted will be considered plagiarism and result in a grade of zero for the assignment.

Course grades. Consistently with the policy of the University of Toronto, course grades submitted by an instructor are reviewed by a committee of the instructor's college before being posted to ACORN. Grades are not official until they are posted to ACORN. Course grades may be adjusted where they do not comply with <u>University Assessment and Grading Practices Policy</u>, policies found in the TST conjoint program handbooks, or college grading policy.

Policies

Attendance. Students are expected to attend class each week (unless alternative/accessibility arrangements have been made; see below). Please inform the class instructors in advance if you will be unable to attend a lecture. If a student misses two class sessions throughout the semester, they should make immediate arrangements (or as soon as possible) to meet one of the instructors to discuss their future in the course.

Direct quotations should be placed within quotation marks. (If small changes are made in the quotation, they should be indicated by appropriate punctuation such as brackets and ellipses, but the quotation still counts as a direct quotation.) Failure to document borrowed material constitutes plagiarism, which is a serious breach of academic, professional, and Christian ethics. An instructor who discovers evidence of student plagiarism is not permitted to deal with the situation individually but is required to report it to his or her head of college or delegate according to the <u>TST Basic Degree Handbook</u> and the <u>University of Toronto Code of</u> <u>Behaviour on Academic Matters</u>. Students will be assumed to have read the document "<u>Avoidance of</u> plagiarism in theological writing" published by the Graham Library of Trinity and Wycliffe Colleges.

Style. The writing standard for the Toronto School of Theology is Kate L. Turabian, *A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Theses and Dissertations*, 9th edition (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2018). This

course does not demand strict compliance with these rules, but assumes their general frame as a guideline. The *Manual*'s website also offers <u>a quick guide to Chicago style</u> that, although not exhaustive, should be enough to help you get started with the basics.

Back-up copies. Please make back-up copies of essays before submitting them on Quercus.

Obligation to check email. At times, the course instructor may decide to send out important course information by email. To that end, all students in conjoint programs are required to have a valid utoronto.ca email address. Students must have set up their utoronto.ca email address which is entered in the ACORN system.
