# **Course Syllabus**

# I. Course Description

This course is designed to offer students with an intermediate knowledge of Greek the opportunity to increase their fluency in Greek reading and to explore the diversity of Hellenistic Greek. It follows upon Intermediate Hellenistic Greek I (or 3 semesters of Greek). The aim is to practice extended reading in Greek, to introduce the students to a variety of Greek texts, both canonical and extra-canonical, and to continue to work with more advanced grammatical and syntactical concepts.

### C. Course Evaluation

Evaluation will be based on class participation (including ease in reading the Greek text out loud), weekly quizzes and a final exam involving translation, parsing and analysis.

Class participation: 20% Greek reading: 10%

Weekly quizzes (top 10 out of 11): 30%

Final exam: 40%

### IV. Course Schedule

The course will follow a weekly schedule of readings chosen to introduce students to Hellenistic Greek in a variety of styles and genres. Readings include texts such as 2 Maccabees (Martyrdom of Eleazar), Ignatius of Antioch, Martyrdom of Polycarp and (Greek) Perpetua, Magician's Handbook, Josephus. The readings will be chosen also to demonstrate to students the ways in which the language of the texts, and in particular aspects of their style, affects both their meaning and their impact.

Course work will include extended translation, vocabulary work and parsing in preparation for class as well as in class; practice reading out loud in Greek; readings and exercises designed to explain advanced grammatical concepts; and analysis of texts.
